# News From Vanuatu

### More Severe Cyclones in Vanuatu

Tropical Cyclone Lola ripped across Vanuatu after making landfall on October 26th, 2023, with gusts at its peak of up to 295 kilometres per hour placing it in the highest threshold of the cyclone categories - a Category 5 cyclone. In total, Vanuatu suffered three major cyclones in a period of a little over one year, a climate crisis that was reported with great effect to international government representatives attending the recent COP28 in Dubai, United Arab Emirates.

### Vanuatu Chevening Scholars

The three Chevening Scholars who arrived in the UK last September 2022 to complete their one year course of study for a Masters degree returned to Vanuatu in September 2023 after completing a successful year and all were awarded degrees.
